This design is recognized by Anglos as a swastika and caused great controversy in the late 1930s. Navajo weaving - Wikipedia In Navajo weaving, the slit weave technique common in kilims is not used, and the warp is one continuous length of yarn, not extending beyond the weaving as fringe. Traders from the late 19th and early 20th century encouraged adoption of some kilim motifs into Navajo designs.

Spanish settlers had brought their Churro sheep to the region in the early 1600s and introduced the Navajo to wool.

Originally from the north, the Navajo were late arrivals in the Southwest. They learned sheep herding from the Spaniards and weaving from the Pueblos in the early eighteenth century.

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
